First Impressions from our Rector

I have thoroughly enjoyed my first term as Rector of St Patrick's College. I have been hugely impressed by the quality of the staff, by the opportunities and achievements of the students, by the supportive culture within the College and by the positive support for the College from so many people in the wider Wellington community.

My vision for the College is to ensure that it is genuinely Catholic, that the students practise their faith; that they understand what it means to be Marist; that they excel in all spheres of life – spiritual, academic, sporting and cultural and that, when they leave school, they serve the communities where they live.

Our academic results for 2013 were again impressive. 85% of Year 11 students passed NCEA Level One; 90% of Year 12 students passed NCEA Level Two and 77% of Year 13 students passed NCEA Level Three. We gained 15 NZQA Scholarships with Georges Tinawi, our 2013 Dux, being awarded a Top Scholar award for his five Scholarships.

The College's capacity to help students excel and live up to their potential is enhanced by the Foundation's financial contribution which provides for additional staffing for our "banded classes" in the junior school, our Old Boys mentoring programme and with our Scholarship programme which includes a Scholarship class in Statistics and in English.



Sports results already this year are fantastic. We won the McEvedy Shield for the third time in three years by a clear margin from Wellington College. Our 1st XI cricketers beat St Bede's outright. Our senior Futsal (indoor soccer) team won the national title, the juniors were runners up. The softball team was second in NZ, the volleyballers were regional champions. The Water Polo team was fourth in the North Island champs and we won our first rowing medal at the Maadi Cup – the national secondary school championships, for over 10 years.

There are two big challenges for the school. The first is to keep the students practising their faith in an age when many of their parents do not attend Mass. The second is the cost of the seismic strengthening of our buildings. What we need is support in the form of prayer, encouragement and financial assistance to help us ensure that all students have the best opportunities to learn and to ensure the College's facilities are up with the best for a school that has our distinctive heritage, reputation and high standards.

ST PATRICK'S COLLEGE FOUNDATION Past Present Future



St Pats College has produced 13 All Blacks over the years. They are E Harper (1904–06); TW Lynch (1913,14); RJ McKenzie (1913,14); PF Markham – aka Father Paul Kane (1921); JL Brownlie (1921); MJ Brownlie (1922–28); P McCarthy (1923); TG Corkill (1925); JM Blake (1925,26); A Mahoney (1929– 36); JJ Best (1935–36); BEL Finlay (1959); J Collins (2001–7).

The greater proportion are pre World War 2, and this probably highlights the role that the boarding nature of St Pats pre 1931 (when St Pats Silverstream opened and took over the boarding component) played. Since World War 2 Silverstream has produced four All Blacks, one English and two Scottish Test players.

An interesting fact is that, despite the small numbers, SPC old boys stuck together when they did make the All Blacks. Tom Lynch and Jock McKenzie both made their debuts in the 1st Test against Australia in 1913, with Lynch scoring 3 tries and McKenzie 2, with the All Blacks winning 30/5. There's a question for Trivia Nights – which school has accounted for 5 tries by players in a Test on debut? Then in 1921 two SPC old boys Paul Markham and Laurie Brownlie both played their only game for the All Blacks against New South Wales, unfortunately losing 17/0. Obviously let down by the other 13!

In 1925 two more old boys, Jack Blake and Tom Corkill, toured Australia, but neither was to play an international, as even in 1926 when Blake again toured Australia, no tests were played on either tour. Both were however members of the glorious Hawkes Bay Ranfurly Shield teams of the 1920s so both had their compensations there.

Maurice Brownlie, one of the greatest All Blacks ever and a captain, provides the link between the early 1920s and the end of that decade, when Athol Mahoney took up the torch and carried it through till the 1935/6 tour of the UK, Ireland and Canada, when he was joined by Jack Best. Best epitomised the change in St Pats' structure of 1931 with the College's boarders departing to the newly opened Silverstream, as he represented the 1st XV of Town in 1929, 1930 then of Silverstream in 1931 and 1932.

There was then a long break through till 1959, when Brian Finlay played in the 1st test against the Lions, but it was too much for him, he got injured after 10 minutes and that was his All Black career. There seemed to be a curse that bedeviled SPC old boys for the next 50 years when provincial greats like Robert Gray just didn't get his chance in black while lesser mortals did.

And even Jerry Collins, the saviour of St Pats' reputation in the 2000's, went off injured in his first Test and there were some who felt he had been struck down by the mystery virus that prevents SPC old boys from distinguished All Black careers.

But now the school has a magnificent new sports facility, and there is no reason why St Pats can't revive the glory days when the Brownlies and Mahoney took no prisoners. The college motto of "Sectare Fidem" was never more apt.

The Legend of the Class of 1908

The year 2014 marks the centennial of the commencement of World War 1 – a conflict which caused enormous suffering and grief for the boys of that generation and their families. Although the main commemorations will be held next year – the 100th anniversary of the landings at Gallipoli – it is also important to mark the commencement of the conflict in 1914.

During the conflict 63 old boys of the college lost their lives, and many more returned scarred physically and emotionally – many so shattered as to never return to full health. It is important to remember that the Roll of Honour board in the College administration foyer records only those who died during the war, but a fair number Sig Pears before the War - form III in 1908.

came back from the war only to die in the influenza epidemic of 1918, or to slowly succumb to the effects of mustard gas poisoning, or from shell shock that left so many unable to return to a 'normal' life.

One of the fascinating stories relating to St Pat's and World War 1 concerns the legend of the class of 1908 – and many generations grew up hearing their story.

The legend goes that the entire class enlisted. It seems that the story is largely correct. It is clear that all the old boys who were eligible, excepting two who were married, volunteered for military service. Sixteen were passed fit for active service. The others would have been rejected as not meeting the health requirements, although it is apparent that some who were initially rejected on these grounds were able to enlist later, as fitness requirements relaxed.

Andrew Curry, died aged 22 years;

Cornelius Lynch, was a coal miner from the west coast, died of wounds aged 28 years;

John Nee, a farm labourer from Canterbury, was killed in action at Messines – aged 23 years;

Thomas O'Connor, who won the Military Medal for 'conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty' at Passchendaele, eventually died of his wounds received in the battle;

James McGinley, aged 22 years, who had received a scholarship to come to St Pats, was accidentally shot and killed by a sentry.

Footnote: Up until 1911 St Pat's was the only Catholic boys boarding college, hence why so many of our Old Boys of this era came from all over New Zealand. St Bede's opened in 1911 and St Patrick's Silverstream followed in 1931.

This image shown from the 1917 Blue and White, indicates that six had been killed – but another two were to die in 1918, the final year of the war. Those believed to be in the photo, and who died, are:

Albert Beswick, who died from illness at Gallipoli aged 21 years;

Philipp Manu Blake, who died at Gallipoli, was a gifted rugby player, and had toured Australia and New Zealand as part of a national Maori rugby team;

Charles Browne, who was wounded at Gallipoli, recovered, and then fought in France where he was wounded a second time. A wound which on this occasion proved fatal – aged 24 years;

There were a number of outstanding individual performances.

In the Open grade, Marcus Karamanolis broke the McEvedy record in both the 1500m and 3000m races. His time of 4.04.60 broke the 1500 m record that had stood since 1966. Earlier in the day Marcus ran the 3000m in 8.45.27 almost 5 seconds inside the 20 year record. Year 12 student, Alex Haye won the 200m and 400m Open double.

In the Under 16 grade Siosaia Paese broke the long jump record and also added the triple jump title. Fa'aolataga Tau won the 100m / 200m /400m treble. Billy Proctor won 3 titles in the Under 15 grade. The 100m hurdles, high jump and the triple jump. Yasheek Rosario won the 100m / 200m double and Josh Nairne the 400m / 800m. Eden Cruise completed our domination on the track in this age group with a comprehensive win in the 1500 metres.

Nathaniel Sulupo, Meinrad Fitsemanu, Sanasco Crichton, Andre Hart, Gerard Ahnau and William Sauea won titles in throwing events. Mason Scott Lucas and Zach Donaldson ensured all four triple jump titles went to SPC by winning the Under 14 and Open events.

Peter Havell, Rusi Jagose-Dickens and Matthew Arand also took titles on the track in the U16 1500m, U16 3000m and Open 800m respectively. Jack Hansen won the Open High Jump title.SPC dominated by winning three of the four relays.
